Annual Report – 2020

Chair and Executive Director's Report

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Like all performing arts organisations around the world, The Australian Ballet was severely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Retaining our audiences and supporting our company of highly talented dancers, artistic workers and administration staff, together with maintaining core operations while theatres were shut and our major source of income from ticket sales was severely impacted, created immense challenges for us. We are deeply grateful for the encouragement and support we received during this difficult year, which made it possible for the company to restart confidently in 2021.

We had planned 2020 as a Year of Limitless Possibilities to farewell our longest-serving Artistic Director, David McAllister, who retired in December 2020 after almost 40 years with the company, over 19 of those served as our much-loved and highly successful seventh Artistic Director. We thank and congratulate David for his achievements as a dancer and an outstanding artistic leader of The Australian Ballet. While the company and all our supporters were very sorry to be unable to farewell David in the style he deserved, we look forward to maintaining a close and warm friendship with David. In February 2020, after a twelve-month search, The Australian Ballet announced the appointment of David Hallberg as its eighth Artistic Director, commencing in January 2021. As live performances were cancelled across the globe during 2020, we were provided with an unexpected and invaluable opportunity for David Hallberg to come to Australia and undertake a detailed, in-person handover with David McAllister before he finished in December.

Our 2020 performance year began successfully in January with a summer-holiday season of our Storytime Ballet for children, but we were able to present only nine mainstage performances of our planned annual schedule of 155 performances before theatres shut down in early March. This included a six-performance season of our newly commissioned Graeme Murphy production *The Happy Prince* at Brisbane's Queensland Performing Arts Centre; in March, we managed to stage three performances of our triple bill *Volt* at Arts Centre Melbourne. This program featured two works by Wayne McGregor and the premiere of *Logos* by our Resident Choreographer Alice Topp. We were unable to present any live performances after 14 March 2020.

Our investment in digital skills and content served us well during the remainder of 2020 as theatres remained shut. During the extended period of COVID-disrupted months, maintaining a relationship with audiences and supporters was a priority for The Australian Ballet and Orchestra Victoria. From April to December 2020 we drew on our catalogue of recorded productions to provide At Home with Ballet TV, a regular series of two-week, free digital 'seasons' of a ballet. Twelve seasons were presented to over 104,500 audience members; the ballets included our much-loved productions of David McAllister's The Sleeping Beauty, Graeme Murphy's Swan Lake and Rudolf Nureyev's Don Quixote. David McAllister and our dancers held regular interactive livestreams with our patrons to stay in touch. Our choreographic workshop Bodytorque moved online and three new ballets were created and presented by company dancers and musicians in 2020. Adult ballet classes continued online, attracting over 50,000 participants. Our Education and Outreach programs were also digitally delivered to 26,153 young people in 116 schools, colleges and groups, and many of our dancers engaged in a program to provide remote mentoring to ballet students in 53 dance schools across regional Australia.

In parallel with our audience engagement activities, in 2020 The Australian Ballet prioritised keeping our company together and in good shape, in every sense. Maintaining the health and wellbeing of and support for our dancers, musicians and company members was a major priority. While working from home, our dancers continued daily classes online and received one-on-one coaching from our ballet staff.

Our Artistic Health team provided health-and-wellbeing support through one-on-one online consultations and online tutorials on finance and physical and mental wellbeing. The rest of the company worked effectively together via Microsoft Teams, maintaining regular contact with one another as we worked on managing core operations throughout 2020 and planned for our return to the stage in 2021. Through extraordinary and commendable efforts, teamwork and care for one another, our dancers, musicians, artistic staff and all company members stayed close, supported each other through 2020, and have now returned to the stage in great shape for 2021. We congratulate them all for their outstanding teamwork and loyalty to the company. While we hope not to have to work this way again, it was remarkable how quickly everyone adapted to working from their spare rooms and kitchen tables, accepting the temporary change in conditions to get through 2020 and doing all they could to maintain The Australian Ballet as a strong vibrant hub of creativity, and an ambitious and supportive workplace.

With over 60% of The Australian Ballet's normal revenue generated from box-office ticket sales, the prolonged period of theatre closures and consequent lack of performance income meant that box-office income fell by \$32m in 2020 compared with 2019. To support the company's operations the Board approved the use of available reserves totalling \$7.3m in 2020 and the company reported a net outflow of cash from operations of \$6.6m for the year. We are most fortunate to have had these reserves to assist us, built through prudent management and generous philanthropic support over many years. The significant loss of income from our artistic and associated activities was mitigated by essential ongoing support from our Government partners. We thank the Federal Government for the invaluable support we received through the JobKeeper scheme. Our thanks also to both the New South Wales and Victorian governments for their generous additional funding support. Our sponsors and wonderful philanthropic patrons, who maintained their contributions and provided additional thoughtful gifts and annual giving donations, sustained us with their friendship and generosity. This included over \$3m in donated ticket refunds from patrons unable to attend cancelled shows. Our Foundation Board, Ballet Ambassadors and Friends and Ballet Society groups continued to meet and assist the company throughout 2020 in many and diverse ways. This generosity, together with essential costsaving measures and the support of our staff, who all worked reduced hours and received lower wages for much of the year, also contributed to the company's survival in 2020.

As a result of the combined support from governments, partners and patrons, and the endeavours of all our staff and management, the company was able to contain its reported loss from operations to \$2.4m in 2020. We would like to thank everyone who worked with us to preserve this much-loved company during such difficult times.

Sincere thanks are also due to our hardworking Board, who met frequently throughout 2020 and provided invaluable advice and support for the company during the year. The experience and insights our directors brought from corporate and other sectors provided essential leadership in 2020. John Ellice-Flint retired from the Board in February 2020, having served a maximum term, and was replaced by Natasha Stott Despoja. We would like to thank John for his invaluable service as a director and as a member of the Board's Investment Committee and Audit and Risk Committee. Our sincere thanks also go to Edwina McCann, who resigned from the Board in October 2020 and as Chair of the Company's Foundation Board, and was replaced by Jane Freudenstein in both roles.



David McAllister, one of the most significant leaders in Australian dance, retired from The Australian Ballet at the end of 2020 after nearly four decades with the company.

Due to COVID-19, David's last year wasn't the celebration we planned, but we can still pay tribute to the extraordinary career he has had with The Australian Ballet.

David's name has become synonymous with dance in Australia. He has moved audiences as a performer, led 20 years of growth as Artistic Director and worked tirelessly as an advocate for dance and Australian artists.

His creativity, collaborative spirit, generosity, commitment to excellence and relentless drive for innovation and success has defined his life's work, and he has made an outstanding contribution to the benefit of audiences, dancers, choreographers and our dance sector.

David's career as a dancer is well documented, starting when he was seconded to the company in the early 80s while still at The Australian Ballet School, through to his retirement from the stage in 2001 after eleven years as a principal artist with the company.

David performed all the great roles in the ballet repertoire and became internationally renowned after he won the Bronze Medal at the Fifth International Ballet Competition in Moscow in 1985 – a three-week competition against the best 150 dancers in the world that led to David and his partner, Elizabeth Toohey, appearing with the Bolshoi Ballet and becoming the first Australians to perform as guest artists with the Mariinsky Ballet (then the Kirov Ballet).

While constantly working to challenge himself and achieve greater artistic heights, David's principal objective was always to elevate The Australian Ballet and the art form.

This commitment bore fruit when David was appointed Artistic Director of The Australian Ballet in 2001.

During his directorship, he worked with some of the world's best creative talents to present 19 new full-length ballets to Australian audiences. He began the *Bodytorque* program to develop and present emerging choreographers, including Alice Topp, now the company's resident choreographer. He created his own beautiful, full-length version of *The Sleeping Beauty*, one of our all-time best-selling productions. He took the company on eleven international tours, including its 50th anniversary tour of New York. He created an Education and Outreach program that takes The Australian Ballet into schools across the country, and the Storytime Ballet series, made especially for children; he made a commitment to commissioning works by First Nations artists, starting with Ella Havelka, the company's first Indigenous dancer, appointed by David in 2013.

Above all, David has been dedicated to providing the best possible environment for his dancers, to ensure they can perform at their peak. He built an internationally recognised Artistic Health team and, with the support of the Board, initiated a maternity leave policy that has allowed a generation of dancers to balance careers and parenthood and has prolonged the careers of many talented artists while creating a supportive, family-friendly environment.

David's dedication to Australian dance extends well beyond his stewardship of The Australian Ballet and into Australian and international dance communities. He gives his time and experience graciously and widely.

David has been the embodiment of The Australian Ballet for the last two decades and it is thanks in no small part to David that the company is the success it is today. We thank him for his contribution and wish him every success with his future endeavours.



THE HAPPY PRINCE

The Happy Prince, a new work created for our company by the celebrated Australian choreographer Graeme Murphy, was originally planned for 2019 but had been delayed due to Graeme's ill health. Rescheduled as the opener for our 2020 season, it made its world premiere in Brisbane at QPAC's Lyric Theatre and swiftly won over the audience with its vivid colour and vital characters. Without the interruption of an interval, it deftly sketched Oscar Wilde's moving story of compassion, love and sacrifice. Kim Carpenter's stunning, bright designs were like the pages of a fairytale opening and disgorging its weird and wonderful characters, and Christopher Gordon's specially commissioned score thrummed with incident and emotion. The buzz on opening night was palpable, and it seemed that 2020 was off to a brilliant start.

VOLT

Our 2020 Melbourne season opened with the highly anticipated contemporary triple bill Volt. Two works by the British innovator Wayne McGregor book-ended a world premiere by our Resident Choreographer Alice Topp, the follow-up to her highly acclaimed Aurum. The threat of COVID-19, which only weeks ago had seemed distant, was drawing ever closer. Events moved with frightening speed, and after three performances, Arts Centre Melbourne closed its doors.

All those who were fortunate enough to attend those performances will never forget them. Crisis can heighten artistry, and the dancers flung themselves into McGregor's headlong choreography, with the musicians of Orchestra Victoria matching their precision and attack in the pit.

A particularly emotional highlight was the debut of Alice Topp's Logos, which struck straight to the heart with its passionate pas de deux and cinematic staging, including a rainstorm that drenched the performers. It was an extraordinary moment in the company's history.

The Australian Ballet's Storytime Ballet series was made possible by the generous support of Gandel Philanthropy, The James and Diana Ramsay Foundation and over 2,000 Individual donors across Australia.

Over the summer of 2019/20, our Storytime Ballet: *The Nutcracker* put stars in the eyes of our tiniest dancers. David McAllister adapted this Petipa classic with its rich Tchaikovsky score especially for children, introducing interactive elements that encourage kids to dance, play and enter into the story. The Edwardian-inspired sets and costumes by Krystal Giddings were designed especially for the production, and Orchestra Victoria provided the recorded music played at all performances.

DIGITAL ENGAGEMENT

In 2020, our primary means to reach and entertain our audiences was through video, imagery and editorial on our digital channels. Even in a year when we were unable to perform, our digital audience of over one million – across our website, social media platforms and email subscribers – continued to grow. The highlight of the year was the *Dancing with David* series, short videos shared on YouTube, Instagram and Facebook in which David McAllister demonstrated simple ballet exercises to do at home. The series was a hit with all ages and abilities, generating over 950,000 views. Our blog, *Behind Ballet*, was read by over 150,000 people with particular interest in the advice from our Artistic Health team in articles like *Strength Beats Stretch, The Benefits of Ballet* and *How to Get Strong Calves*.

As a gift to Australians, we presented twelve productions on BalletTV and YouTube for free, which received over 104.5k views – a reach equal to almost half of our typical mainstage attendance for the year. The most popular production was David McAllister's *The Sleeping Beauty*, which received 21,516 views.

AT HOME WITH BALLET TV

Even though our theatres were dark for most of 2020, we were determined to bring the exhilaration, magic and escape of ballet to our isolated community. Beginning in April 2020, we curated a series of free cinema-quality performances on our BalletTV platform, available for watching any time during their two-week seasons. The program featured some of our most beloved ballets and reached audiences who had never had the chance to see them in person. Several ballets were shown with their counterparts from the 1980s and 90s so that audiences could enjoy the performances of stars from former eras. Coming together online to watch ballet was the perfect antidote to the boredom and anxiety of lockdown.

BODYTORQUE DIGITAL

With The Australian Ballet in lockdown, the dancers unable to physically meet for class and rehearsal, and performance after performance cancelled in line with Government restrictions, the company got creative with *Bodytorque*, traditionally a showcase for new choreography staged in smaller venues or as pop-up performances in mainstage programs. Reimagined as a digital season featuring new works by our dancers and collaborations with Orchestra Victoria, its intimate scale allowed for the ballets to be filmed without contravening social-distancing protocols. Our *Bodytorque.Digital* offerings were filmed in the empty National Gallery of Victoria and from home, and together constitute a remarkable tribute to the tenacity and adaptability of the creative impulse.

RECORDING AND BROADCAST

Recording and Broadcast continued to support strategic content creation and delivery for departments across the organisation including Marketing, Digital, Media, Philanthropy, External Relations, Audience Engagement and Artistic, and coordinated David McAllister's online celebratory program and our digital season At Home with Ballet TV.

ABC Commercial

ABC Commercial worked closely with us in 2020 to ensure maximum benefit for our audiences during the pandemic. Due to current international licence agreements in place with various overseas broadcasters and platforms, all At Home with Ballet TV content was geo-locked to Australia to ensure current commercial agreements were not compromised and our content didn't diminish in value.

ABC Commercial continued to licence our content throughout the global market. New agreements included Canadian Broadcasting Co-operation, Sky Arts UK, NHK Japan, Stellar Inflight, Radio e Televisao de Portugal and ATW in China.

ABC iView

ABC Commercial licenced eight of our ballet titles to ABCTV/iView's Arts Campaign and our ballet titles performed higher than forecast. The total initiative of the campaign content played equalled 30 arts programs. Our content made up the substantial proportion of this, which shows how popular our titles have been.

IN CINEMAS

Despite the global pandemic our partnership with CinemaLive continued with various titles screened across cinemas in the United Kingdom, Germany, Australia and New Zealand including a dance season curated by Cineplex cinemas across Canada in November and December. Titles included *The Sleeping Beauty, The Merry Widow, Spartacus, Cinderella* and *Coppélia*.

WORLD BALLET DAY

Despite renewed lockdown restrictions in Melbourne, World Ballet Day went ahead in 2020 as a 'low-fi' version, pre-recorded over Microsoft Teams. Although we had limited access to dancers and resources, our Recording and Broadcast team went to great lengths to ensure our involvement, and the program was pushed to the World Ballet Day site, Facebook and YouTube. There were 465,000 LIVE views of our segment.

AUDIENCE ENGAGEMENT

The Step Inside program presents events, talks and classes that take audiences behind the curtain to delve deeper into the art form. In 2020, we were able to deliver programs as part of the Brisbane season of *The Happy Prince* and on the first weekend of the Melbourne *Volt* season prior to the COVID-19 lockdowns.

When the lockdowns took effect, our Audience Engagement program moved to digital delivery of our popular Studios classes. We produced high-quality, pre-recorded classes that participants could stream nationally or internationally. Both the free and paid versions of the classes reached all corners of Australia; there was a particularly strong response from regional audiences, who wouldn't ordinarily have the opportunity to take classes with us in our Melbourne studios. Our new international audience came primarily from USA, the UK, Japan, New Zealand, Germany and Singapore.

EDUCATION & OUTREACH

The Australian Ballet's Education & Outreach program includes workshops for pre-school, primary and secondary students, as well as creative and community residences, which in 2020 included performances of Lucas Jervies' *Plain Jane* (a reimagination of *Cinderella* with a heroine who resists societal expectations) and Ella Havelka's *Wilaygu Ngayinybula // Possum's two minds* (an exploration of mental balance).

Our performances are designed to be relevant to all young people. Through dance education programs, online offerings and performances with social themes, we open the doors of our ballet world and show young people their place within it, encouraging and inspiring our future creatives.

In 2020, we launched a number of new initiatives to connect more deeply with young Australians, our community and our teachers, and to contribute to the growth of sustainable pathways in dance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and creatives.







A thank you from our Philanthropy Director

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In years from now, 2020 will go down as a landmark year for The Australian Ballet. Yes, it was a year that presented some of the biggest challenges we will ever experience – professionally and personally – but it also revealed the true heart and soul of our special Ballet community and the depth of their passion as they helped to keep the company (and art form) alive and dancing in Australia.

When our extraordinary dancers took their curtain call on 14 March 2020, little did we know that it would be their final live performance for the year. Overnight everything stopped and suddenly, without ticket sales, philanthropy was our only steady source of non-Government income.

The spotlight was shifting to the audience and patrons; it was their moment to shine. And shine they did!

As David Hallberg has observed, the relationship between The Australian Ballet and its supporters is "personal, meaningful and symbiotic." And so, while our first instinct in the wake of the COVID-19 lockdowns was to check in on our community, we were incredibly touched when they just wanted to know that we were okay and that the dancers were being cared for.

In the days, weeks and months that followed, we were inundated with messages and pledges of support from every corner of Australia, and from supporters old and new. From leadership gifts, annual gifts and one-off donations to legacy gifts in wills, a substantial proportion of the funds needed to keep us dancing through the uncertainty were generated by our Ballet community.

What I found most heartwarming was the groundswell of generosity from our audiences, who sadly missed out on live performances after our venues were closed. A staggering 4,500 subscribers and ticket buyers chose to donate the value of their cancelled tickets back to the company, the collective impact of which was vital in sustaining us through this period.

It was only because of this outpouring of support that we were able to respond with such agility – finding new and interactive ways to stay connected with our company and constituents through the most challenging year in our history.

Our community's collective generosity enabled us to keep all our artists, artistic support staff and artisans employed, and to make sure the health and wellbeing of our dancers were prioritised through a comprehensive at-home support program. We were able to continue sharing the joy of ballet with our audiences far and wide through a digital season featuring some of our finest full-length ballets. We launched an online program of adult ballet classes that was enjoyed by participants from the comfort of their homes; developed a new *Bodytorque.Digital* season to foster the choreographic talents of our dancers; and adapted our Education & Outreach program to online delivery to keep connecting with and inspiring young people in schools and communities across Australia.

And, while it was not possible to come together in person, we delivered a series of live virtual events and afternoon teas to keep our patrons and subscribers connected with one another online. It was wonderful to see how our digital and streaming platforms made it possible for us to bring people together through our shared love of dance, no matter where they were in the country.

It's been both humbling and heart-warming to experience the camaraderie, resilience and support that kept us dancing through our time of need and propelled us into a vibrant new era with David Hallberg as artistic director. In time, when we reflect on this period, I truly believe that we will recognise 2020 as the year we not only survived but grew closer together.

I will be forever grateful to have had our supporters standing with us in a true partnership when we needed them most. It's time for them to take a bow.

Orchestra Victoria is a specialist opera and ballet orchestra and performance partner of The Australian Ballet and Opera Australia. Established in 1969 as the Elizabethan Melbourne Orchestra, it performs in Melbourne's premier theatres with national, state and international opera and dance companies.

Although the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic required the postponement of its pit activities and regional touring, Orchestra Victoria reached new audiences through its digital programs. From its streamed Vault Session performance with ARIA-award winning band The Teskey Brothers to new online programs for tertiary students and early career musicians, the company reached out to support the sector, its artists and its audiences.

2020 ARTISTIC HIGHLIGHTS

The year commenced with a busy and vibrant program of live performances, including a critically acclaimed season of *Salome* with Victorian Opera, the return of the Five at 5 series with a performance featuring all sections of the orchestra, and the opening-night performance of The Australian Ballet's *Volt* season, which included the world premiere of Alice Topp's *Logos*.

Orchestra Victoria responded quickly to the restrictions on live performance from mid-March 2020, creating new digital collaborations with The Australian Ballet for the emerging choreographers' program *Bodytorque.Digital*. These new works featured musicians on screen with dancers, performing newly commissioned scores by Australian composers Eric Avery, Natalie Nicola, Tomas Parrish and Georgia Scott. A new digital collaboration with the National Gallery of Victoria paired music with featured artworks from its collection, enabling access to visual arts and providing a new perspective for both art and music lovers.

The company also created new digital content for tertiary-student and early-career musicians, such as the podcast So You've Got the Gig, VCE masterclasses and the Mock Audition Program, designed to build audition skills and the first of its kind in Australia. Digital tutorials were also developed for Orchestra Victoria's flagship On the mOVe! education program; these will enhance learning outcomes for participating students.

In the final months of the year, as restrictions started to ease, the orchestra was able to pursue larger-scale recording projects, including an album recording of Australian composer Christopher Gordon's *The Happy Prince Suite*, due for release in 2021; a live streamed concert *So This is Christmas*, with Victorian Opera; and Vault Sessions featuring The Teskey Brothers and Orchestra Victoria, presented by Arts Centre Melbourne and the Australian Music Vault.

DIRECTORS' BENEFITS

No director has received or become entitled to receive a benefit (other than a benefit included in the amounts paid or payable to directors as disclosed in the financial statements) by reason of a contract with the director, a firm of which the director is a member, or an entity in which the director has a substantial financial interest, by The Australian Ballet, or an entity that The Australian Ballet controlled when the contract was made or when the director received or became entitled to receive the benefit.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

During the financial year, the principal activities of the Group constituted by The Australian Ballet (the parent entity), and the entities it controlled, were:

- Promoting, encouraging and producing ballet in Australia and overseas
- Provision of orchestral services to the ballet, opera and other commercial activities
- · Property investment and management, and
- Acting as a corporate trustee.

There was no significant change in the nature of the above activities during the financial year.

CONSOLIDATED RESULT

The net consolidated result of the Group for the financial year ended 31 December 2020 was a loss of \$0.2m (2019: consolidated surplus of \$6.2m).

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE STATE OF AFFAIRS

Despite the dramatic disruption of COVID-19 there were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Group during the financial year.

MATTERS SUBSEQUENT TO THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR

2020 was a challenging year for The Australian Ballet, but as restrictions arising from the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic are gradually eased, and performance venues re-open, The Australian Ballet will be returning to theatre-based performances in 2021.

Whilst The Australian Ballet has scheduled and programmed 2021 as a normal/pre-COVID year, a high amount of uncertainty remains regarding the level of government restrictions which will apply when the company performs and public confidence to return to theatre. There is a risk that COVID-19 will further impact the company's capacity to deliver the program it has planned in 2021, further affecting the operations and the financial performance of the company. The company's 2021 budget has taken this into consideration and assumes low theatre capacities (50% of normal availability) resulting in a deficit for the year. It is noted however that:

- Sales of 2021 Subscriptions have been strong.
- The Australian Ballet Group held significant financial resources at 31 December 2020 including \$7.2m cash and cash equivalents and \$77.1m in financial assets.
- The Australian Ballet Group's financial assets include \$16.9m of assets available for general purpose. Further information on financial assets and whether they are held for specific or general purposes can be found on page 8 of the Directors' Report.
- The Australian Ballet has a two-year loan facility of \$15m (2020-2022) available for draw down if needed. The loan is secured by a mortgage and guarantee over the Primrose Potter Australian Ballet Centre.
- The Australian Ballet has a long-term financial liability in respect of a \$10m interest bearing loan from Treasury Corporation of Victoria which is not due for repayment until 31 October 2032. There are no financial covenants attached to this loan.
- The Australian Ballet Group expects to be able to pay its debts as they become due and payable for the twelve-month period from the date of signing of the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Except for the potential impact of COVID-19, no other matter or circumstance has arisen since 31 December 2020 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect:

- (a) the Group's operations in future financial years; or
- (b) results of those operations in future financial years; or
- (c) the Group's state of affairs in future financial years.

ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATION

The Group complies with all relevant Federal and State Law environmental performance obligations. No environmental breaches have been notified by any government agency during the financial year ended 31 December 2020.

INSURANCE AND OFFICERS

The Australian Ballet paid a premium in respect of a contract insuring its directors and officers against liabilities and expenses arising as a result of work performed in their respective capacities, to the extent permitted by law.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

This commentary should be read in conjunction with the table on page 7 which presents the consolidated result of The Australian Ballet Group for the year ended 31 December 2020 in the format used by Management and the Board.

THE AUSTRALIAN BALLET (EXCL ORCHESTRA VICTORIA)

2020 was a challenging year for The Australian Ballet. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the company was unable to perform in theatres from 14 March 2020 to the end of the year, delivering only 9 of its 155 planned mainstage performances. Regional touring and other community programs were similarly affected.

With over 60% of its revenue normally generated from box office ticket sales, this prolonged period of non-performance meant that to a significant extent, the company relied on its reserves to support the operations of the company. In a year in which revenue from performance fell by over \$32m, The Australian Ballet drew down \$7.3m from available resources, including invested capital that would otherwise have generated income for future periods, to support the company's operations and reported a net out flow of cash from operations of \$6.6m for the year.

The significant loss of income from the Artistic Program and other associated Commercial Activities was mitigated by the ongoing support of Government, both Federal and State, our sponsors and generous gifts and annual giving donations from our patrons including over \$3m in donated ticket refunds from cancelled shows.

The Australian Ballet is very grateful that as part of the National Performing Arts Partnership Framework, the company received essential and generous core funding from the Australian Government of \$6.2m and a further \$6.2m of support through the JobKeeper scheme. In addition, funding was received from the Victorian (\$0.7m), New South Wales (\$0.7m) and Queensland governments (\$50k) in 2020.

This contribution, together with strong cost management and the support of staff who worked reduced hours and so received lower wages for much of the year, saving the company circa \$3m, meant that the company was able to contain its reported loss from operations to \$2.4m.

THE AUSTRALIAN BALLET GROUP

The Australian Ballet Group's consolidated result for 2020 was a deficit of \$0.2m. This result includes non-recurring benefits from the Jobkeeper Scheme, reduced working hours and donated tickets, as well as endowed donations and bequests, and specified purpose donations that were not available for general operations, as follows:

Without these valuable contributions, the underlying result for The Australian Ballet (excluding Orchestra Victoria), would have been a deficit of \$18.3m.

1 CORPORATE INFORMATION

The financial statements of The Australian Ballet for the year ended 31 December 2020 were authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on 30 April 2021. The nature of The Australian Ballet's operations and principal activities is disclosed in the Directors' Report. The Australian Ballet is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Australia.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This note provides a list of the principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements to the extent they are not already discussed in the other notes. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated. The financial statements are for the consolidated entity consisting of The Australian Ballet and its subsidiaries.

(a) Basis of Accounting

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) Act 2012.

Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements

The consolidated financial statements of the Australian Ballet comply with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

(b) Historical Cost Convention

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for certain financial assets which have been measured at fair value through other comprehensive income.

(c) New and Amended Standards Adopted by the Group

No new or amended Standards were adopted by the Group in 2020.

(d) Statement of Compliance

Accounting Standards include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards.

(e) Critical Estimates and Judgements

There are no critical estimates or judgements in the consolidated financial statements

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(f) Comparatives

Where a change in accounting treatment has resulted in significant differences between financial years, prior year data has been reclassified to assist comparison.

(g) Income Tax

The entities in the consolidated entity are exempt from income tax and no provision is required.

(h) Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements presented combine the financial statements of all the entities in the Group constituted by The Australian Ballet and the entities it controls. The Group controls entities where the Group's exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Note 21 provides details of the entities comprising the consolidated entity. The effects of all transactions between entities in the Group have been eliminated in full.

The financial statements of subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as the parent company using consistent accounting policies. Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the consolidated entity and cease to be consolidated from the date on which control is transferred out of the consolidated entity. Where there is loss of control of a subsidiary, the consolidated financial statements include the results for the part of the reporting period during which The Australian Ballet had control.

(i) Production Costs

The cost of each new production is written off in the year in which it is first presented. Costs of refurbishing former productions are written off in the year incurred.

With the cancellation of performances in 2020, costs relating to productions that were scheduled to premiere in the year, including *Anna Karenina* and *Harlequinade* were expensed in the year given the uncertainty of future production schedules.

Performance Fees are recognised as revenue when the performance takes place.

III. Sponsorship and Government Grants

Sponsorship and Government Grants are recognised in the period to which the sponsorship and grants relate. Government Grants are normally paid for the specific calendar years. Sponsorship which relates to a specific performance is brought to account in the year the performance is given.

IV. Donations

Donations are recognised as revenue upon attaining control over the donation.

5 JOBKEEPER PAYMENTS

As part of its response to COVID-19, in March 2020 the Australian Government announced various stimulus measures resulting from the economic fallout from the coronavirus lockdown. One such stimulus measure was the payment of subsidies to qualifying employers under the JobKeeper Payment scheme ('JobKeeper'). The initial Jobkeeper payments were a wage subsidy whereby employers who qualified for the stimulus received \$1,500 per fortnight for each eligible employee who was employed by the company during the period 1 March 2020 to 27 September 2020. The Jobkeeper scheme was extended from 28 September 2020 to 3 January 2021. Payments to eligible employees were split into 2 Tiers depending on total hours worked in the fortnight; Tier 1 subsidy was \$1,200, Tier 2 subsidy was \$750 per fortnight.

The Group determined that it was eligible to receive JobKeeper payments, which totalled \$6.186m in the period to 3 January 2021.

JobKeeper payments are government grants and are accounted for under AASB120 Accounting for Government Grants and Disclosure of Government Assistance.

Government grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and the Group will comply with all attached conditions.

Government grants are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with the related costs which they are intended to compensate. The JobKeeper subsidy has been presented in Other Income - Government Grants in the consolidated Statement of Profit or Loss. The subsidy partly offsets employee costs in 2020, as follows:

9 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group's activities expose it to market risks including foreign currency, interest rate and security prices, and credit risk.

(a) Foreign Currency

Cashflow Hedge (derivative)

In order to minimise any adverse effects on financial performance of the Group, financial instruments, such as foreign exchange forward contracts are used to hedge certain foreign currency risk exposures.

Forward foreign exchange contracts are only used for economic hedging purposes and not as speculative investments. Hedges were taken out to hedge the Group's exposure to committed foreign currency production payments. The Group originally hedged A\$2,625,667 against US\$1,973,188 at the set exchange rate of 0.7515 and A\$418,340 against US\$312,500 at the set exchange rate of 0.7470.

In 2020 the remaining two hedge contracts matured. At 31 December 2020 the Group had not entered into any new arrangements whereby forward foreign exchange contracts were deemed required.

Cashflow Hedges that Qualify for Hedge Accounting

When forward foreign exchange contracts are used to hedge forecast transactions, The Australian Ballet designates the change in the fair value of the foreign exchange contract as the hedging instrument. Gains or losses relating to the foreign exchange contract are recognised in the Cashflow Hedge Reserve within Equity. Amounts accumulated in equity are reclassified to profit or loss in the period when the hedged item affects profit or loss.

There were no reclassifications from the Cashflow Hedge Reserve to profit or loss during the period.

(b) Interest Rate - refer to note 13 Leases and note 16 Borrowings

(c) Security Prices

The Group's exposure to equity securities price risk arises from investments held and classified in the balance sheet as fair value through other comprehensive income (refer to note 10).

The fair value of Financial Assets at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income is determined using quoted market prices. The fair value of forward foreign exchange contracts is determined using forward exchange rates at balance sheet date.

(d) Credit Risk

The Australian Ballet is exposed to credit risk if counter parties fail to make payments as they fall due in respect of:

- payment of trade receivables, and
- contractual cashflows of debt investments carried at amortised cost.

Credit losses on trade receivables and debt investments are negligible. The loss allowance provision for trade receivables as at 31 December 2020 was \$157k (2019;\$157k).

The Group classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- Those to be measured subsequently at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income
- . Those to be measured at amortised cost.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cashflows. Investments in debt instruments are measured at amortised cost. Investments in equity instruments are not held for trading and the Group has made an irrevocable election at the time of initial recognition to account for equity investments at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income.

(b) Measurement

- I. **Debt Instruments:** Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows, where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal, and interest, are measured at amortised cost. A gain or loss on a debt instrument that is subsequently measured at amortised cost and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired. Interest Income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method.
- II. **Equity Instruments:** The Group measures all equity instruments at fair value. The Group presents fair value gains and losses on equity investments in Other Comprehensive Income. There is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to profit or loss following the derecognition of the investment. Dividends from such investments continue to be recognised in the Profit or Loss Statement as Other Income when the Group's right to receive payments is established.
- III. **Reserves:** The Group measures fair value gains and losses on equity instruments within the reserve, Financial Assets at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI).

Impairment

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstance indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable. For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. If any such indication exists and where the carrying values exceed the estimated recoverable amount, the assets or cash generating units are written down to their recoverable amount.

Recoverable Amount of Assets

At each reporting date, the Consolidated Entity assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. Where an indicator of impairment exists, the Consolidated Entity makes a formal estimate of recoverable amount. Where the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the greater of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. It is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset's value in use cannot be estimated to be close to its fair value less costs to sell and it does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or Groups of assets, in which case, the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of the money and the risks specific to the assets.

Accounting for the Group's Leasing Activities

The Group leases various properties and equipment. Rental contracts are for fixed periods but may have extension options. Lease terms are negotiated on an individual basis and contain a wide range of different terms and conditions. The lease agreements do no impose any covenants, but leased assets may not be used as security for borrowing purposes.

Contracts may contain both leases and non-lease components. The Group allocates the consideration in the contract to the lease and non-lease components based on their relative stand-alone prices. However, for leases of real estate for which the Group is a lessee, it has elected not to separate lease and non-lease components and instead accounts for these as a single lease component.

Leases are recognised as a right-of-use asset and a corresponding liability at the date at which the leased asset is available for use by the Group. Each lease payment is allocated between the liability and finance cost. The finance cost is charged to profit or loss over the lease period to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for the lease term on a straight-line basis.

Assets and liabilities arising from a lease are initially measured on a present value basis. Lease liabilities include the net present value of fixed lease payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentive receivable and variable lease payments that are based on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date.

Right-of-use assets are measured at cost on the initial measurement of the lease liability. Right-of-use assets are generally depreciated over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term on a straight-line basis.

Lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, which is generally the case for leases in the Group, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate is used, being the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment with similar terms, security and conditions.

The incremental borrowing rate is determined where possible, by using recent third-party financing received by the Group as a starting point, adjusted to reflect changes in financing conditions since third party financing was received. Adjustments made are specific to the lease, eg term, country, currency and security.

The Group is exposed to potential future increases in variable lease payments based on an index or rate, which are not included in the lease liability until they take effect. When adjustments to lease payments based on an index or rate take effect, the lease liability is reassessed and adjusted against the right-of-use-asset.

Payments associated with short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised on the straight-line basis as an expense in profit or loss. Short-term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less. The Australian Ballet offices on Level 4 Hickson Road, The Rocks is a short-term lease that matured 16 January 2019. The lease agreement has not been renewed. Low-value assets comprise of IT-equipment and small items of office furniture.

Extension and Termination Options

Extension and termination options are included in property and equipment leases across the Group. These terms are used to maximise operational flexibility in terms of managing contracts. Most of the extension and termination options are exercisable only by the Group and not by the respective lessor.

(b) Employee Benefits

The following liabilities arising in respect of employee benefits are measured at their nominal amounts:

- Wages and salaries, annual leave and other leave regardless of whether they are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.
- Other employee's benefits which are expected to be settled within twelve months of balance date.

Other employee benefits, including long service leave, are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wages and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yield at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

16 BORROWINGS

Unsecured - Loan 10,000 10,000

The principal for the unsecured loan is due for repayment on 31 October 2032.

Borrowings are initially recognised at fair value, net of transaction costs incurred. Borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Any difference between the proceeds (net of transaction costs) and the redemption amount is recognised in profit or loss over the period of the borrowings using the effective interest method. Fees paid on the establishment of loan facilities are recognised as transaction costs of the loan to the extent that it is probable that some or all of the facility will be drawn down. In this case, the fee is deferred until the draw down occurs. To the extent there is no evidence that it is probable that some or all of the facility will be drawn down, the fee is capitalised as a prepayment for liquidity services and amortised over the period of the facility to which it relates.

The unsecured loan of \$10 million is interest bearing at 3.94% pa. Finance costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred 2020 \$398,311 (2019: \$394,205).

In addition to the unsecured loan of \$10m detailed above, The Australian Ballet negotiated a two-year loan facility of \$15m in the year. At 31 December 2020 no funds had been drawn down from this facility. The loan is secured by a mortgage and guarantee over the Primrose Potter Australian Ballet Centre.

27 MATTERS SUBSEQUENT TO THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR

2020 was a challenging year for The Australian Ballet, but as restrictions arising from the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic are gradually eased, and performance venues re-open, The Australian Ballet will be returning to theatre-based performances in 2021.

Whilst The Australian Ballet has scheduled and programmed 2021 as a normal/pre-COVID year, a high amount of uncertainty remains regarding the level of government restrictions which will apply when the company performs and public confidence to return to theatre. There is a risk that COVID-19 will further impact the company's capacity to deliver the program it has planned in 2021, further affecting the operations and the financial performance of the company. The company's 2021 budget has taken this into consideration and assumes low theatre capacities (50% of normal availability) resulting in a deficit for the year. It is noted however that:

- Sales of 2021 Subscriptions have been strong.
- The Australian Ballet Group held significant financial resources at 31 December 2020 including \$7.2m cash and cash equivalents and \$77.1m in financial assets.
- The Australian Ballet Group's financial assets include \$16.9m of assets available for general purpose. Further information
 on financial assets and whether they are held for specific or general purposes can be found on page 8 of the Directors'
 Report.
- The Australian Ballet has a two-year loan facility of \$15m (2020-2022) available for draw down if needed. The loan is secured by a mortgage and guarantee over the Primrose Potter Australian Ballet Centre.
- The Australian Ballet has a long-term financial liability in respect of a \$10m interest bearing loan from Treasury Corporation of Victoria which is not due for repayment until 31 October 2032. There are no financial covenants attached to this loan.
- The Australian Ballet Group expects to be able to pay its debts as they become due and payable for the twelve-month period from the date of signing of the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Except for the potential impact of COVID-19, no other matter or circumstance has arisen since 31 December 2020 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect:

- (a) the Group's operations in future financial years; or
- (b) results of those operations in future financial years; or
- (c) the Group's state of affairs in future financial years.
